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

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

Five graduate F-35 PIFTU class

LUKE AIR FORCE BASE, Ariz. - Five allied nation military personnel successfully graduated from the first official F-35 Partner Intelligence Formal Training Unit class, Nov. 10, 2022, at Luke Air Force Base, Arizona.

The first of its kind, the F-35 PIFTU course is meant to expedite and improve intelligence training and collaboration between the U.S. and foreign partner nation intelligence organizations, specifically regarding F-35 Lightning II systems and capabilities. It was conceptualized in 2019 by U.S. Air Force Maj. Joy Lomheim Nguyen, U.S. Air Forces in Europe and Air Forces Africa Fifth Generation Interoperability Branch engagements officer, who recognized a need for such a course after becoming a part of the F-35 program at USAFE.

"I began attending various engagements with F-35 counterparts and operators in the European theater," said Lomheim Nguyen. "After several events, I noticed that not all issues, specifically regarding intelligence, were being fully accounted for and actioned."

Lomheim Nguyen encountered multiple obstacles along her three-year journey while attempting to assemble the F-35 PIFTU course. Just when all hope felt lost, she found U.S. Air Force Maj. Kevin Hawkins, Joint Force Command Naples deputy theater collection manager, who immediately jumped on board to bring Lomheim Nguyen's vision to life.

At the time, Hawkins was the 56th Operations Support Squadron wing intelligence chief at the 56th Fighter Wing, Luke AFB, Arizona. The 56th FW is the largest fighter pilot training base in the U.S. Air Force with a robust international training mission.


Suicide crisis benefit expansion

WASHINGTON — As of Jan. 17, Veterans in acute suicidal crisis can go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no cost — including inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit.

This expansion of care will help prevent Veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost, world-class care to Veterans in times of crisis. It will also increase access to acute suicide care for up to 9 million Veterans who are not currently enrolled in VA.

Preventing Veteran suicide is VA's top clinical priority and a top priority of the Biden-Harris Administration. This effort is a key part of VA's 10-year National Strategy for Preventing Veteran Suicide and the Biden-Harris administration's plan for Reducing Military and Veteran Suicide. In September, VA released the 2022 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report, which showed that Veteran suicides decreased in 2020 for the second year in a row, and that fewer Veterans

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Designs sought for poster contest

Whether you're a seasoned photographer or a budding painter, here's your opportunity to show off your talent and use your artwork to honor Veterans.

VA and the Veterans Day National Committee are now accepting submissions for the 2023 Veterans Day Poster Contest. Submissions are due by 8:59 p.m., PDT, April 1, 2023.

This contest is open to all. Your art should reflect this year's theme of "Service." Veterans have shaped the American character, giving us an extraordinary legacy of patriotism and honor. Their service represents the highest form of citizenship.

Briana Cummings, creator of the winning 2022 design, entered the contest because "I believe in the VA mission, not only as a VHA employee but as an indebted citizen of our nation. The sacrifices our service members and their loved ones endure to secure our freedoms astound me. As a designer, I entered the contest to express my utmost gratitude for our Veterans and to help honor them on Veterans Day."

Cummings' poster is shown at right.

The winning poster will be distributed to VA facilities, military installations worldwide and across cities and towns in our nation. It will also serve as the cover of the official program for the Veterans Day observance at Arlington

National Cemetery, scheduled for Nov. 11, 2023. Although creativity has no rules, there are a few submission guidelines:

• Artwork must be 18" x 24" at 300 dpi, with scaled down submissions to 9"x12."

• The design will be used for a 1" x 1.5" lapel pin. Simple designs look best scaled down to lapel pins. If you'd like to submit a modified design for the lapel pin based on the original poster design, you may do so.

• Submissions are not restricted to "humancentric" images, such as a joint color guard. Images of American icons, monuments or scenery can qualify.


• Submissions must be representative of all Veterans who served. The Committee may select a particular submission but ask the artist to modify the original design. Additional changes may be required prior to printing.

• Each design must include the words "Veterans Day," "November 11, 2023," and "Honoring all who served."

• All submissions must include sufficient information to demonstrate that the image is the artist's work and is not copyrighted material (i.e., photos and concepts).

Successful designs are very simple, with minimal imagery and verbiage. To view examples of past winning submissions, visit The Veterans Day Poster Gallery.

He was assigned to the K-9 unit of the 527th Military Police Company, 709th Military Police Battalion, 18th Military Police Brigade, in Ansbach, Germany.

Personnel from the 341st TRS and the 701st Military Police Battalion, an Army detachment here, started the morning with Zachary by doing a "Hero Workout of the Day" to honor his father.

"A lot of times I'm overwhelmed with emotion, so it's hard to say a lot of words," said Laura Rodriguez, Zachary's mother, at the end of the workout. "I'm good at lecturing my kids, I'm good at lecturing my patients, but as a Gold Star Spouse, I don't always have the words to say. All of this is really meaningful to our family." Zachary said he knew he wanted to join the military at five-years-old because of his father.

"Seeing him do his job was so cool," he said. "Tve always wanted to be like my dad, and at the same time, be my own self. In fact, I drive the Jeep he bought in Germany. I got it for my 18th birthday."

Zachary spent the rest of the day with 341st TRS personnel doing military working dog training, such as patrol, detection, and obedience work.

He experienced being the "bait" for an MWD by doing bite work; conducted a building search; and trained a dog to scout in an open field, which are all part of patrol work.

"I had a great time. I barely slept at all last night," he said. "I was so excited for this, but at

the same time nervous. I do like to see and follow my dad's footsteps and see what he did... I think this was a really cool experience."

The visit ended with a ceremony at The Military Working Dog Teams National Monument here, attended by 341st TRS personnel, 701st Military Police Battalion personnel, Zachary's mother and two sisters, Malorie and Charlie.

Zachary and his family are Gold Star Family Members. Gold Star family members are those who lost a loved one in military service supporting combat operations or from terrorist activities.

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
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

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) — On

Jan. 10, Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III rescinded the Aug. 24, 2021, memorandum mandating that members of the Armed Forces under Department of Defense authority be vaccinated against COVID-19, and the memorandum of Nov. 30, 2021, pertaining to the vaccination of National Guard and Reserve personnel. This rescission requirement was established by the James M. Inhofe National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2023.

The health and readiness of the Force are crucial to the Department's ability to defend our nation. Austin continues to encourage all service members, civilian employees, and contractor personnel to get vaccinated and boosted against COVID-19 to ensure Total Force readiness.

died by suicide in 2020 than in any year since 2006.

"Veterans in suicidal crisis can now receive the free, world-class emergency health care they deserve – no matter where they need it, when they need it, or whether they're enrolled in VA care," said VA Secretary for Veterans Affairs Denis McDonough. "This expansion of care will save Veterans' lives, and there's nothing more important than that."

VA has submitted an interim final rule to the federal register to establish this authority under section 201 of the Veterans Comprehensive Prevention, Access to Care, and Treatment (COMPACT) Act of 2020. The final policy, which took effect on Jan. 17, will allow VA to:

• Provide, pay for, or reimburse for treatment of eligible individuals' emergency suicide care, transportation costs, and follow-up care at a VA or non-VA facility for up to 30 days of inpatient care and 90 days of outpatient care.

Make appropriate referrals for care following the period of emergency suicide care.
Determine eligibility for other VA services and benefits.

• Refer eligible individuals for appropriate VA programs and benefits following the period of emergency suicide care. Eligible individuals, regardless of VA enrollment status, are:

• Veterans who were discharged or released from active duty after more than 24 months of active service under conditions other than dishonorable.

• Former members of the armed forces, including reserve service members, who served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation either directly or by operating an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

• Former members of the armed forces who were the victim of a physical assault of a sexual nature, a battery of a sexual nature, or sexual harassment while serving in the armed forces.

Over the past year, VA has announced or continued several additional efforts to end Veteran suicide, including establishing 988 (then press 1) as a way for Veterans to quickly connect with caring, qualified crisis support 24/7; proposing a new rule that would reduce or eliminate copayments for Veterans at risk of suicide; conducting an ongoing public outreach effort on firearm suicide prevention and lethal means safety; and leveraging a national Veteran suicide prevention awareness campaign, "Don't Wait. Reach Out."

"When Joy [Lomheim Nguyen] first reached out about creating a shared training course, we were all about it," said Hawkins. "Our team and leadership saw it as an amazing opportunity to help the United States and our allies operate better together in the future."

Hawkins was already a part of intelligence training for personnel supporting F-16 Fighting Falcons. Which meant, he understood the impact a course like this could have on partner nations and the overall benefits that come with it.

"For a fighter unit to operate effectively, it's a lot more than just flying the planes," said Hawkins. "One of the most important background elements is intelligence support. In a fight, if our allies have learned about enemy capabilities or weaknesses, we'd want to be able to share that knowledge with them, and vice versa."

The course emphasizes and familiarizes intelligence personnel on radar, electronic warfare, infrared spectrum, low-observable principles, F-35 systems and capabilities, F-35 air-to-air missions, F-35 air-to-ground missions, and mission planning to F-35 considerations.

Before seeing the first class attend the course he helped bring to fruition, Hawkins received orders for a new assignment and had to pass the torch to a new instructor. He passed it into the capable hands of U.S. Air Force Maj. Daniel Diamond, 56th OSS wing intelligence chief, and a team of individuals who are equally passionate about seeing this course and its students succeed.

"If we're going to fight together, and we're flying the same planes, in the same air space, with the same objectives, then we need to be able to plan, coordinate, and debrief together," said Diamond. "That's been a huge impetus to better develop our processes and collaboration."

Pulling this off was no small feat, however. It was the drive and dedication of the small team of instructors as well as a much larger network of individuals at Luke AFB that made the F-35 PIFTU course come to life.

"Without Lt. Col. Jim Farrell [944th Op-

erations Support Flight wing intelligence chief], Tech. Sgt. John Hemmerich [56th OSS F-16 Intelligence Formal Training Unit instructor], and Staff Sgts. Cortney Haralson and Aubrey Smith [56th OSS intelligence analysts], this course would truly not exist," said Diamond.

"They took all of this on as a secondary duty, working with the Advanced Programs Office, the 56th Communications Squadron, foreign partner nations and foreign disclosure officers at Luke AFB and elsewhere, to make it possible for us to secure and set up a facility, build a syllabus and academics, refine coursework, build training scenarios, teach students, and so much more, all while performing their primary responsibilities for the 56th and 944th Operations Groups."

The first class saw five students from Denmark, the Netherlands, and Norway work together to graduate and forge lasting relationships for future endeavors. The students noted how the course could increase effectiveness within their air forces by creating more intelligence personnel who can support F-35 operations, as well as the benefit of meeting their counterparts in partner militaries.

Early exposure to multinational collaboration in the intelligence community can lead to more robust and faster interoperability. The ability to rapidly share information between ally nations is critical in a dynamic warfare environment. Establishing a baseline for intelligence sharing is a step towards seamless future integration, which is exactly what the F-35 PIFTU team at Luke AFB is aiming to achieve.

Although the course was hosted at Luke AFB and led by U.S. Air Force instructors, each student was able to share their unique, country-specific training with everyone involved. Lomheim Nguyen has high hopes for the future of the course.

"I hope PIFTU continues to be made available for F-35 partner nations," said Lomheim Nguyen. "And that F-35 intelligence training will be expanded to other interested F-35 nations worldwide, whether at Luke or elsewhere, to further provide this paramount training across the F-35 allied global consortium."



Family Child Care

BECOME A LICENSED FCC PROVIDER Spouses of active duty, retired military members, DoD civilians and other individuals affiliated with DoD, upon review, living both on and off base, are eligible to become licensed Family Child Care (*FCC*) providers. Providers must be at least 18 years of age, speak, read, and write English, have a high school diploma/ GED, be able to pass background checks and attend required trainings. Call the FCC office, or e-mail; patricia.mangrum.1@us.af.mil, or visit: www.militarychildcare.com.

SPOUSE APPOINTMENT CHILD CARE

Military spouses may qualify for free childcare for job interviews/orientation, appointments, and classes they may have, through FCC.

FREE PCS CHILD CARE

Active duty personnel of all ranks, with PCS orders in-or-out of Luke AFB, may qualify for up to 20-hours of free child care, per child, with Family Child Care (only) providers. PCS care must be used 60-days prior, or 60 days after PCSing to Luke. Bring your orders to the Airman & Family Readiness Center to receive a certificate for care.

FREE DEPLOYMENT CHILD CARE

Active-duty or Reserve/Guard (active status) personnel assigned to Luke, can receive 16-hours of free child care - per child. Child care hours may be used before (once a member receives orders), during (16 hours per month), and after (within 60 days) a contingency operation deployment, or if a member is deployed for a minimum of 30 calendar days, or if personnel are routinely deployed on a short-term basis.


