U.S. Air Force Brig. Gen. Gregory Kreuder, 56th Fighter Wing commander, relinquished command to U.S. Air Force Brig. Gen. Jason Rueschhoff, during a change of command ceremony at Luke Air Force Base, Arizona, July 29, 2022.

Rueschhoff, a command pilot with more than 2,800 flight hours in the F-35A, A-10C, AH 64-E, T-38 and T-37, including more than 250 combat hours, arrived to Luke AFB following a position as the deputy commander of the 7th Air Force at Osan Air Base, Republic of Korea.

He earned his commission and a Bachelor of Science degree from the United States Air Force Academy in 1997, in addition to Masters Degrees in Military Operational Art and Science, Airpower Art and Science, and one in Strategic Studies.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Gen. Craig Wills, 19th Air Force commander, Joint Base San Antonio-Randolph, Texas, presided over the ceremony welcoming Rueschhoff.

"One of the great things about our Air Force is that we are one great family and when an Airmen steps aside, there's another one standing right there to take up the flag and take it to new heights," said Wills. "We are very fortunate to welcome Brig. Gen. Reuschhoff and his family to the 56th Fighter Wing."

Rueschhoff thanked everyone in attendance and those who supported him in the



path to get here, and addressed the wing.

"I am thrilled to be able to stand here and take command of this wing, but I know who is really running this, it's you all," said Rueschhoff. "You are the one's making it happen. I look forward to meeting all of you. Look forward to working with all of you. Look forward to learning from you."

Wills also praised Kreuder for his accomplishments and thanked the wing for their commitment over the past two years. "Freddy (Kreuder), your dedication has

been truly world class," said Wills. Kreuder welcomed Rueschhoff and ex-

pressed gratitude to the men and women of the 56th Fighter Wing.

U.S. Air Force Lt. Gen. Brian S. Robinson, commander of Air Education and Training Command, and U.S. Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Erik Thompson, command chief of AETC, engaged with Airmen and gained insights of various missions during a visit to Luke Air Force Base, Arizona, July 20 and 21, 2022.

The leadership team visited units including the 62nd, 63rd, and 425th Fighter Squadrons, the 310th Aircraft Maintenance Unit, and the 607th Air Control Squadron. Each stop allowed





Robinson and Thompson the opportunity to speak with Airmen and gain first-hand understanding of their unique missions and culture, while also observing overall contributions to the AETC training environment.

Airmen also offered in-depth perspectives about the direct impact their roles have in the execution of Luke's missions. An example of the waves Airmen are making to training and mission capability was housed within the 56th Security Forces Squadron Combat Arms Training and Maintenance (CATM) unit. The team explained


As we make the journey to self-acceptance remember that we cannot give up what we do not possess.

It's change of command season at Luke Air Force Base. U.S. Air Force Brig. Gen. Gregory Kreuder, 56th Fighter Wing commander, served as the reviewing officer when U.S. Air Force Col. George Watkins relinquished command of the 56th Operations Group to U.S. Air Force Col. Matthew Johnston on June 3, 2022.

Johnston, a command pilot with more than 2,000 flight hours in the T-37, T-38, AT-38, F-16C/D, and F-35A Joint Strike Fighter, earned his commission from the United States Air Force Academy in 2001 with a Bachelor of Science in Management.

Having served as the director of operations for the 388th Operations Support Squadron and as the commander of the 34th Fighter Squadron at Hill AFB, Utah, Johnston says he understands how much squadron commanders have on their plates.

"I see my role as an enabler," said Johnston. "I want to help eliminate obstacles so squadron commanders, senior leadership, and Airmen can do their jobs."

This is Johnston's second assignment to Luke AFB. In 2007, he was an F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot evaluator and chief of training for the 309th Fighter Squadron. He says he is impressed with what he has seen while visiting the flight line and is excited to be back in fighter country.

"I really want to see the squadrons accomplish their mission," said Johnston. "If they're accomplishing their mission, the group accomplishes its mission."

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
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

The 56th Equipment Maintenance Squadron unveiled an F-16D Fighting Falcon painted in a heritage color scheme at the 310th Air Maintenance Unit hanger on Luke Air Force Base, Arizona, June 17, 2022. This particular jet was the first American F-16 to score an aerial victory.

"The aircraft earned the moniker 'MiG Killer' as a result of the events that took place on Dec. 27, 1992." said U.S. Air Force 1st Lt. James Mobbley, 56th EMS Fabrication Flight officer in charge, at the unveiling ceremony. "On this day, Lt. Col. Gary "Nordo" North, who was flying this F-16D, tail number 0778, led a flight of four F-16s on a routine Operation Southern Watch mission in Iraq."

During this mission, an armed MiG-25 Foxbat entered into the no-fly zone. Realizing that he and his wingmen were in danger, North requested clearance to fire.

"He finally heard 'bandit-bandit-bandit, cleared to kill'

over his headset," said Mobbley. "North locked on with an AIM-120 AMRAAM (Advanced Medium Range Anti-Aircraft Missile), fired his missile, and eliminated the MiG."

The paint scheme for this jet was accomplished by 12 Fabrication Flight Airmen assigned to corrosion control at Luke AFB, as a means of honoring North's actions and Air Force heritage. The paint job required 1,500 man-hours and more than 13 gallons of paint.

"This 'What if' design pulls cues from the Desert Camouflage Uniform worn during the first Gulf War, and a similar experimental livery of camouflage that was tested at that time," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Michael Cichonsky, 56th Equipment Maintenance Squadron F-35 low observable aircraft structural maintainer. "Very few pictures exist of the test scheme, since it was hand rolled using latex paint, and only lasted a week before being removed. With this design, we not only pay homage to the history of General North and 0778, but it also allows us to reimagine if this paint scheme was selected for use during Operation Southern Watch."

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

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


