Members of the 58th RQS, along with Airmen from other bases, have been deployed to various countries in Africa as part of the 82nd Expeditionary Rescue Squadron where they have performed numerous exercises and missions.

The 82nd ERQS responded to multiple lifesaving rescues throughout 2022. Some of the missions they accomplished are as follows: rescuing a patient in critical condition from a ship, transporting a patient with an eye injury from a ship, providing care to a U.S. Navy SEAL injured by a gunshot, a two-day search to recover the remains of a local Djiboutian that drowned in a river, and assisting the Djiboutian Coast Guard in picking up survivors of a sunken Spanish tour boat.

"For me, accomplishing the mission is bittersweet," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Patrick

knowing exactly what we will be called to do; therefore, we train throughout the year to maintain currencies and ensure the team is fully mission capable," said Limage. "Whether it's performing a free fall parachute jump from an aircraft or hoisting from a helicopter, if there is a way, we will find it. We will go to extreme lengths and do everything in our power to bring these members home and reunite them with their family and friends."

The 82nd ERQS creates a newsletter detailing each month's rescues, training exercises, morale boosting events while also highlighting Airmen that have been essential to accomplishing those tasks.

POW/MIA Recognition Day Ceremony

The 355th Wing held a POW/MIA Recognition Day ceremony at the Pima Air and Space Museum on Sept. 16, 2022.

The guest speaker was former prisoner of war Harvey Horn who served with the 772nd Bomber Squadron, 463d Bomber Group, 15th Air Force based in Foggia, Italy 1943-1945.

"My story is about 36 days that changed my life," said Horn. "It's a story of a Jewish boy from Brooklyn who dreamt of flying and enlisted in the Army Air Corps, it's about survival."

Horn recounted his story of being shot down and being held captive by German SS soldiers.

"Being captured by the Germans is not the best of times, being Jewish and captured by the Germans is the worst of times."

Afterwards Horn was presented a ceremonial POW/MIA flag by U.S. Air Force Col. Scott Mills, 355th Wing commander. The flag had been carried during an honorary 5k that occurred earlier in the day at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base.

"You see this table and you hear those words at the beginning of every speech, and you're moved," said Mills. "You hear about the salt symbolizing tears and you feel the loss and grief for the families and the service member."

In his closing remarks Mills challenged the audience to try looking past grief and instead do two things.

"Remember their courage, their sacrifice and their actions. That is what they want to be remembered for, not sadness but courage, toughness and standing alone when our nation called."

The second thing that Mills asks is that we serve. "It's too often that we link service with the uniform, but the fact is we are all called to serve the United States every day," said Mills. "You don't have to wear a uniform to do that. You just have to help someone else."

National POW/MIA Recognition Day was established in 1979 through a proclamation signed by President Jimmy Carter. Since then, each subsequent president has issued an annual proclamation commemorating the third Friday in September as National POW/MIA Recognition Day.



Warrior of the Month

U.S. Air Force Airman 1st Class Lantz Bell was alerted to fly a real-world civil rescue mission that resulted in saving a man experiencing a life threating condition onboard an oil tanker hundreds of miles off the coast of California. This mission integrated the 129th Rescue Wing (California Air National Guard) with one HC-130 to provide air refueling and overhead command and control capabilities. A1C Bell's actions as an HC-130 loadmaster allowed the execution of three helicopter air refuelings, relay of weather reconnaissance and vital communications between a Pararescue team, two HH-60W crews and the Rescue Operations Center.

Bell's coordination led to a flawless mission execution allowing the Pararescue team to stabilize the

critical patient. Ultimately the oil tanker worker was flown in stable condition to Moffett Field for follow on medical care. Bell also led an immersion of the 79th Rescue Squadron. He was able to explain the unit's mission which led to a more focal understanding of combat rescue operations for Airmen of the 355th Mission Support Group. As the unit's mobility/supply guru, Bell was entrusted with maintaining an inventory of equipment valued at \$3M as well as, equipping 25 members with \$350K of required gear for maintaining Immediate Response Force taskings. Lastly, Bell was the point of contact for the unit's beautification contract valued at \$1.3K, ensuring four contractors obtained base access and the scope of work was met.

Limited public service loan forgiveness waiver nearing end

Defense Department personnel with student loan debt might be able to benefit from temporary changes made to the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program.

The Limited PSLF Waiver allows borrowers to receive credit for past periods of repayment, making it easier to have their loans forgiven.

Those who have not already applied for this waiver must submit a PSLF form and consolidate their nondirect federal student loans by Oct. 31 to receive the benefit

The waiver allows borrowers to gain additional PSLF credit, even if previously told they had the wrong loan type or repayment plan.

Those interested can learn more about the limited waiver and who qualifies on the Federal Student Aid Site.

"If you have a federal student loan and are eligible, I encourage you to take advantage of the PSLF waiver benefit today," said Deputy Defense Secretary Kathleen H. Hicks. "A few minutes of your time may save you thousands of dollars on your student loans. Remember, you need to take the steps necessary to qualify."

President Joe Biden also commented on the PSLF program portion of the White House website: "Dedicated public servants are the lifeblood of democracy. They do the hard work that is essential to our country's success — protecting us, teaching our children, keeping our streets clean and our lights on, and so much more."

After the Oct. 31 deadline and beginning on Nov. 1, the standard PSLF program requirements will resume.



KEEPING LEGACIES ALIVE LON

From transport to close air support attack, the 355th Wing Heritage Park has a variety of aircraft, some as old as the United States Air Force itself, that call Davis-Monthan's Heritage Park home.

A cleanup event was held where volunteers washed an F-100F Super Sabre display and cleared debris from the area as part of the 355th Wing's new Aircraft Adoption Program at Heritage Park, Sept. 9, 2022.

"Some of these planes have been out here since the 1970's, that's when Heritage Park was established," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Jose Barrera, 355th Equipment Maintenance Squadron fabrication flight Heritage Park custodian. "There are plaques on the displays about their missions, the pilots that flew them and decorations those pilots achieved."

The 11 retired aircraft that currently reside at Heritage Park all played significant roles during their time in the Air Force and in accomplishing DM's various mission sets throughout the years.

The goal of the 355th Wing's Aircraft Adoption Program is to maintain the appearance of these historical displays and keep their legacies alive long after their final flight.

"We're in the process of changing the park right now by getting rid of aircraft that were not part of our mission sets and receiving new aircraft that are," said Barrera. "It's going to be completely rebuilt and something we can take even more pride in."

The program allows squadrons and local organizations to adopt a display at Heritage Park. Volunteers are responsible for upkeeping their area at least once a year.

All supplies required for upkeep will be provided at no charge to by the Heritage Park property custodian Staff Sgt. Jose Barrera.

"The opportunity to give back to the community by preserving our legacy and protecting our future was a great privilege," said Lynn Stedge, Office of Special Investigations Region 2 OL-B (AFSOUTH) director. "It was nice to get out of the office and do something different from our typical day of work."







It's easy to forget everyone's impact in the big Air Force mission of "Fly, fight and win — airpower anytime, anywhere", especially while working in a back shop on the flightline, or in an office where they sit behind a computer and answer phones all day. Despite how some may feel about their specific duties in the USAF, everything done is a contribution to the mission, no matter how minuscule it may feel in the moment.

To battle this, DM's 5/6 Council came up with the idea for Airmen to shadow other Airmen in different Air Force specialty codes to give them the opportunity to have a better understanding of how everyone contributes to the mission.

The 355th Security Forces Squadron combat arms training and maintenance team were the first to open their doors to Airmen selected to take part in the program for its first iteration.

"It can be easy to assume that some jobs are basic and consist of mundane tasks," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Julius Caesar Piga, 355th SFS CATM instructor and 5/6 Council president. "No one really gets the chance to see behind the scenes and that is where a lot of the impact transpires."

Airman 1st Class Michah Dunn, 355th Communications Squadron cyber network operations technician, and Senior Airman Ryan Miller, 355th Equipment Maintenance aircraft structural maintenance metals technician, are the first two Airmen to take part in this program.

They received a tour of the CATM workspace from its range, to their armory and even filing systems, while also getting hands on experience with small arms weapons and range set up prior to a qualification course taking place.

"This has been a great opportunity to see the Air Force and it's different jobs from another perspective," said Dunn. "There's so much more to Security Forces than handling firearms and scanning ID cards at the gate."

Piga's hope is that this program

continues on and that more people get the chance to experience other AFSCs.

"Some people have fallen into the trap of assuming other career fields don't contribute to the mission equally, but what I am hoping to show with this initiative is that there is a whole lot more than what meets the eye," Piga said. A program like this provides a unique connection and perspective of how all career fields' individual missions blend together to support the overall Air Force mission, not only helping Airmen realize their potential, but also providing a sense of understanding and pride in the day-to-day work that they accomplish.
