Featuring the USAF Thunderbirds aerial display team, this is considered by some to be the Thunderbirds homecoming as it is the last show of the season for the Nellis-based team.

This was the first air show at Nellis since 2019.

Overwhelming praise came from attendees posting on social media.

"Amazing Air show! The weather was excellent and the displays on the ground and in the air were fantastic," Carlos Rojas, via Facebook.

"We were there today, and had a GREAT time. Thanks to everyone who made this happen. Now when we hear them from the house we have a better idea of how things go," Mary K. Bruzek, via Facebook.

"Thank you for the wonderful air show this past weekend, my first time back on the flight line at Nellis in 51 1/2 years since I left after one year stationed at Nellis in May 1971," John Leichliter, via Facebook.

Alongside the Thunderbirds, the crowd were thrilled by a variety of aircraft including the F-35, the F-22 the C-17 and more. There were also

displays from Aftershock, a Joint Tactical Air Control demonstration, and a SERE (Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Escape) demo.

On the ground, attendees could view an MQ-9 Reaper, and F-15, T-6A, T-38, B-52, a KC-46 and many other military and civilian aircraft.

The next Aviation air show at Nellis will be November 2024.

Like many American households, Air Force families are not immune from the problems and stress surrounding childcare, education, housing, health care and finding fulfilling jobs.

We know too that difficulty in one area can influence another, potentially creating a continuous cycle of struggle. I know this is true for our local civilian populations as well, but I believe it is magnified for our military families due to constant moves, lack of family support, and other stressors related to our military way of life, such as deployments.

Many are suffering due to the current housing crisis where families are required to move but are unable to find affordable and safe housing in their new location. This continuous cycle of struggle can lead to other challenges, including food insecurity where some of our military families continue to suffer alone because they are too ashamed to seek help. We cannot do this alone...we need our civilian communities to help us solve these challenges.

These examples, and many more, are why I collaborated with a small group of volunteer Air and Space Force spouses, known as the Thrive Team, to create Five and Thrive. This initiative provides a pathway of communication, an awareness of support and resources, as well as a facilitation of quality-of-life partnerships to help families overcome these types of challenges. This was the overarching vision behind Five and Thrive.

The importance of ensuring safe and satisfied military families is larger than the family itself. There is a direct correlation to our nation's security since the strength military spouses and families bring to the fight ultimately improves the readiness, resilience, and retention of the entire force.

Spouses are now and have always been an important part of our Air Force heritage. Their roots run deep in our Air Force history, and we are thankful to those who forged the path for future spouses to cultivate as they grow and thrive. My "Spouses in the Fight" series shows how spouses of the past inspire our spouses today, and I know they will continue to do so in the future if we keep their memory alive. Here are two impressive examples in the history of "Spouses in the Fight:"

Gladys Vandenberg

Vandenberg, wife of the second chief of staff of the Air Force, would often walk the hallowed grounds of Arlington Cemetery with Gen. Vandenberg. It was during these walks that she noticed Airmen being buried without any family present. Moved to action, she decided to personally attend each service, ensuring that no Airman was ever laid to rest without a member of their Air Force family present.

Eventually, the Arlington Committee was created and since 1948, no matter the weather, Arlington Ladies and Gentlemen serve our Department of the Air Force service members today as they are honorably laid to rest. As spouses in the fight often do, they inspired others to do the same: the Army established their Arlington Ladies in 1972, the Navy in 1986, and the Coast Guard in 2006.

Helen LeMay

In 1961, LeMay, spouse of the Air Force Chief of Staff General LeMay, began leading a community effort to start the Air Force Village, a place widows could find affordable housing. As we all know, it sometimes takes a village to start a village and through the help of many spouses, Air Force Village became a reality. The General and Mrs. Curtis E. LeMay Foundation was later founded to help widows and widowers of all Air Force retirees through financial grants. Today, the Air Force Village is called Blue Skies of Texas and is open to civilians and military of all services no matter where they live.

These spouses of yesterday amaze me as much as our spouses today inspire me. As we celebrate the Air Force's 75th Anniversary, I cannot help but reflect on the wonderful heritage we have. I like to think that we are all "spouses in the fight" just by helping each other and our military families every day.

I hope that I can contribute to this rich heritage even just a little bit by encouraging and supporting all DAF families through Five and Thrive. I also hope that it can serve, like these heritage stories, as a beacon of hope for all "Spouses in the Fight."

Joint teams conduct first F-22 in-flight tests for aircrew CBRN protection

The U.S. Air Force conducted the first in-flight vapor purge tests on the F-22 Raptor with the support of the 422nd Test and Evaluation Squadron and the 59th Test Squadron on Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., Oct. 13-21, 2022.

These tests are a continuation of the Next Generation Aircrew Protection program, which will ensure current and future aircrew gear and operation concepts will modernize rapidly to meet emerging threats while maximizing aircrew performance and protection.

"We want to give the aircrew the highest overall performance they can maintain while being in a contested environment," said 1st Lt. Andrew DeNicola, 28th Test and Evaluations Squadron test engineer.

Researchers are evaluating the time it takes to clear the cockpit of a chemical simulant during flight. They use methyl salicylate, known as wintergreen oil, which is used as flavoring agent in chewing gums and mints. This chemical simulant is safe for the pilot, yet mimics the effects and properties of known chemical warfare agents.

U.S. Air Force test and evaluation personnel placed specialized testing equipment in the cockpit and on the pilot. Then the methyl salicylate was sprayed into the aircraft's engines before takeoff to measure the speed at which concentration of the chemical during flight are eliminated. With this information, researchers determined the time and conditions needed to purge a contaminant from the cockpit, enabling development of informed concepts of operation.

"These novel tests will provide decision superiority to commanders on the current capabilities of protection for their aircrews, allowing them to effectively and safely generate combat airpower in a Chemical Biological Radiological and Nuclear contested environment, which is critical to deterring our near-peer adver-

saries," said Lt. Col. Paul D. Hendrickson, Materiel Leader for Air Force CBRN Defense Systems Branch part of the Air Force Agile Combat Support Directorate. "At the same time, we're dramatically improving our ability to modernize and field the right next-generation protective capabilities to our warfighters at the

speed of relevance ... saving both time and money."

Steve Singleton, NGAP Program Manager from the AF CBRN Defense Systems Branch further elaborated that "following the successful initial efforts in 2018 where we conducted ground tests on the F-22, F-15E, F-15C, F-16 and A-10 aircraft, we learned enough to move forward with our in-flight tests which we started in 2020 on a C-130J and now on the F-15E and F-22. These tests directly support Pacific Air Forces Fight Tonight requirement and are underpinned by the recently published National Security Strategy."

This collaborative effort by the Air Force's CBRN Defense Systems Branch along with the Joint Program Executive Office for CBRN Defense, the Air Force Research Laboratory's 711th Human Performance Wing and 28th Test and Evaluation Squadron is aligned to conduct evaluations across multiple DOD airframe platforms over the next few years.

First Lt. Gunnar Kral, the Lead Engineer for NGAP with the AF CBRN Defense Systems Branch added "If a pilot must operate in a chemically contaminated environment, they have their chem suit, their gloves and mask and it can reduce their capabilities to execute at maximum performance. What we are doing through the Next Generation Aircrew Protection Program is investigating how we can reduce their protection levels safely, allowing them to maximize mission effectiveness to fly, fight and win."

SECDEF's oldest outreach program visits Nevada's premier USAF bases

The Joint Civilian Orientation Conference's 93rd iteration toured Creech and Nellis Air Force Bases in Nevada on Oct. 26, 2022, and witnessed firsthand how the U.S. Air Force is prepared to win the future fight.

Their day started at Creech, where they learned about the MQ-9 Reaper's capability, weapons capacity and munitions systems. Participants were able to sit in the pilot and sensor operator seats while members from the 11th Attack Squadron explained flying techniques and target tracking while in flight.

Afterward, participants traveled to the Nevada Test and Training Range, where they were treated to a combat, search

and rescue demonstration on the NTTR. They observed U.S. Air Force Weapons School Combat Search and Rescue Airmen, A-10 Thunderbolt IIs, HH-60 Pave Hawks and MQ-9s participating in a scenario focused on blue force recovery of two survivors within a few kilometers of the JCOC viewing area. The group then witnessed simulated attacks and a showof-force from A-10s tasked to protect the HH-60s and survivors.

Next, the tour transitioned to Nellis Air Force Base with a short ride on a C-130 Hercules, where they were welcomed by the 57th Wing Vice Commander, Col. Conor W. Hiney.

The day continued with an overview of Shadow Operation Center-Nellis capabilities, emphasizing system and technological initiatives on the leading edge of Air Battle Management Systems development, followed by the 6th Combat Training Squadron and Joint Terminal Attack Controller Airmen.

At the 6th CTS, JCOC participants observed JTACs reacting to a narrated simulation of an ambush supported by A-10s and had a hands-on experience with Tactical Air Control Party equipment and tactical gear.

The last stop for JCOC was on Nellis' flight line, where an F-35A Lightning II was on display. Briefers talked about the F-35's capabilities and the role of the Air Force's newest Aggressor squadron. JCOC members learned how the 65th Aggressor Squadron prepares joint and allied exercise participants with high-end training to compete and win against the pacing threat.

"It was a privilege to host the JCOC 93 team at Nellis AFB today and share the U.S. Air Force story with such an amazing group of individuals. Part of what makes Nellis so special is our relationship with the Las Vegas community, and it was great to expand that community to leaders from across the U.S. I'm thrilled that the JCOC team was able to see what we do at Nellis and, more importantly, meet the airmen who do amazing things to generate airpower for our great country," said Hiney.

Established is 1948, JCOC is the oldest Secretary of Defense-sponsored outreach program. JCOC alumn include CEOs of Fortune 100 companies, nonprofit organizations, presidents of universities and



To kick off this year's JCOC, Secretary Austin stated on social media, "It's a pleasure to welcome business and community leaders who are participating in the Joint Civilian Orientation Conference. public administrators from metropolitan cities.

North Las Vegas opens Veterans, Community resource center

On Oct. 27, 2022, the City of North Las Vegas held a ribbon cutting ceremony to officially unveil the new North Las Vegas Veterans and Community Resource Center.

The center is located at 3090 E. Centennial Parkway, North Las Vegas.

The innovative facility officially opened to the public Oct. 31 with programming ramping up in the coming weeks. The 1,920-square-foot center is open to veterans, active duty service members, and the public, providing a variety of services and activities for the community.

"The vision of my fellow council members and I was to provide a safe and friendly place for the community and those who have served to connect with resources and services, convene for programming and new opportunities, and enjoy social activities with friends and family," Mayor Pro Tem Pamela Goynes-Brown said. "We look forward to working with our community partners to help folks achieve more economic, housing, financial and health success and well-being."

The North Las Vegas Veterans and Community Resource Center team will work hand-in-hand with Veterans and residents by offering a wide range of programs and services. Service areas include employment (i.e. career exploration workshops, mock interviews, job searches), housing (i.e. social services resource fairs, grants programs), education (i.e. computer classes, career training), mental health and well-being (i.e. stress control, substance abuse management, service referrals), finance (i.e. financial literacy workshops, budgeting, credit building), legal (i.e. informational fairs, classes, legal document preparation). The center will be open Monday-Thursday 9 a.m.-5 p.m. For more information, call 702-633-1640.

The North Las Vegas Veterans and Community Resource Center is the latest in a series of innovative initiatives from the City of North Las Vegas to give back to the veteran community, including the creation of CARE (Community Approach to Rehabilitation and Engagement) and Veterans Court programs,





which offer a specialized Treatment Court programs for those who have been accused of non-violent crimes and could benefit from root-cause interventions to reduce recidivism. Additionally, through the North Las Vegas Small Business Connector, the city has funded and supported nearly three dozen veteran-owned businesses in just the past year. The City also utilizes strategic recruitment practices
